1st Annual African American Conference on Disabilities
Tuesday, February 28, 2012

Introduction

This proposal is being submitted to the Arizona Developmental Disabilities Planning Council (ADDPC) as a project that will meet goals and outcomes established by the ADDPC as a part of their 2012-16 Five Year State Plan.

The proposal is designed to fulfill outreach to African Americans persons who are developmentally disabled or disabled, family members supporting them, other persons who offer support, and professionals. African Americans participating in this project will reside in Arizona and will be considered persons whose disability needs are unserved or underserved.

The Conference will also meet the ADDPC current Plan Goal 3, which states that the Council will:

“Empower persons with developmental disabilities, their families, and Others who support them by linking them to information that promotes informed decision making about their choices and quality of life.”

Under this Goal, Objective 2 defines action by establishing that the Council will:

“Provide information and/or link people to reliable information in a variety of formats on topics that are important to persons with developmental disabilities, their families, and other who support them”

Background

The Disability Empowerment Center (DEC) is organized in Phoenix as a campus that hosts 11 organizations whose individual missions are to serve persons with developmental disabilities and other disabilities. The involvement of the DEC as an organization linked to multiple resources within one location has established it as a preeminent resource able to coordinate and provide multiple services from one site.

The DEC, located at 5025 East Washington Street, will host the event on its campus, using the outside atrium, several classrooms and the Nina Mason Pulliam Conference Center. These facilities are unique to the DEC, since they are well known throughout the state, are centrally located, are easily accessible by public transportation, and are fully ADA accessible.

The Arizona Bridge to Independent Living (ABIL) and Arizona Center for Disability Law (ACDL) have agreed to act as leads in coordinating the involvement of the 9 other campus member organizations to host the 1st Annual African-American Conference on Disabilities scheduled for Tuesday, February 28, 2012 at the DEC. The event will be held at the DEC, This event will utilize the resources of the 11 member DEC campus to recruit and involve African Persons with Developmental and other disabilities by pooling contacts, mailing lists and list serves in a manner that is unique to the large outreach carried-out by DEC members.

Purpose

Conferences dedicated to the specific needs of African American persons with developmental and other disabilities are not common in Arizona. The population of African Americans with disabilities affected by low employment, issues related to special education and multiple other concerns are documented in statistics maintained by the Arizona Department of Education and other Arizona State Agencies.

The purpose of the Conference is to provide education to African Americans with developmental and other disabilities, family members, others who support them and professionals related to:

- Finding and Maintaining employment;
- The Americans with Disabilities Act;
- Advocacy and Self-Advocacy
- Legal Options pertaining to guardianship and conservatorship;
- Special Education;
- Mental Health;
- Money Management;
- Health and Wellness

The presentation of educational material and information will focus on specific cultural and other issues that are unique to African American persons with developmental and other disabilities.

Goals of the Conference

The conference seeks to involve 125 participants who will include consumers with developmental and other disabilities, families members, others who provide support and professionals seeking education on how to better serve the underserved African-American community throughout Arizona. No fees will be charged to persons participating in the event.

The Conference seeks to fulfill the following goals in offering education:

1. Full involvement of all 11 member organizations who are part of the DEC community as evidenced by:

- Bringing individual network resources to the event to recruit and register participants.
 - Set-up exhibit tables where information and support can be provided to participants on each organization.
 - Fast and efficient referral to multiple organizations housed within the DEC, offering the opportunity for “one stop” shopping for resources.
2. Full interactive involvement of participants by holding educational sessions on multiple topics that incorporate the exchange of information between facilitators and audience.
 3. Linking participants to community resources that can be used as assets and tools by the African American community after leaving the conference.
 4. Obtaining updated information and data from participants that can be used in identifying needs and planning the delivery of future training and resources.
 5. Development of advocacy/self-advocacy skills that empower participants to become more effective in accessing the community, public policy makers and others who are instrumental in shaping services and resources in Arizona.

Evaluation

The Arizona Center for Disability Law will take the lead in the development of the survey tool and data collection for the African American Outreach Conference

Conference attendees will be provided with two opportunities to provide feedback and evaluation data on the information presented at the conference. Upon completion of each workshop, all participants will receive a survey requesting them to rate the quality and effectiveness of the information presented along with some demographic information. This survey will incorporate standards as outlined by the Administration on Developmental Disabilities survey tool. A link to an on-line post-survey will be emailed at least 30 days after the conference to all participants who provided their e-mail addresses upon registration. The post-survey will request additional evaluation data regarding the effectiveness and application of the information presented at the conference. The responses from the two surveys will be shared with ABIL and the Developmental Disabilities Network to assist these agencies in their statewide efforts to serve the African American Community

Budget Statement

The attached \$5,000 budget details all costs that the ADDPC will fund in their \$5,000 Sponsorship.

Sponsorship

The ADDPC will sponsor the First Annual African American Conference on Disabilities as a means to participate in outreach to persons with developmental and other disabilities within the African American Community. In funding the project the ADDPC will receive the following acknowledgements:

- Prominent recognition as the sponsoring agency in written and printed products used to support and promote the Conference.

- Mention in events during the day of the Conference, acknowledging ADDPC support as a collaborative outreach event to African American persons with developmental and other disabilities, their families and persons who support them in the community.
- Prominent exhibit/display space where information on the ADDPC can be shared with Conference participants.
- Ongoing involvement in the planning related to the conference and post-conference review.
